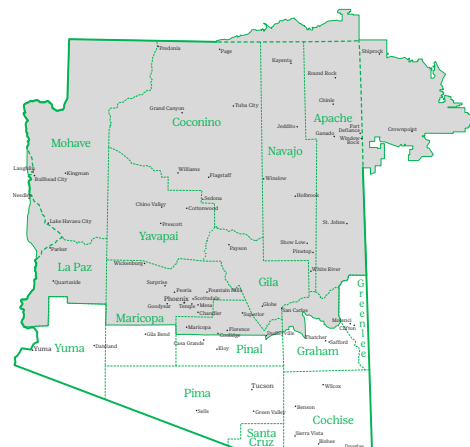
Girl Scouts was founded by Juliette Gordon Low in Savannah, Georgia, on March 12, 1912 and chartered by the United States Congress on March 16, 1950. Our local council, Girl Scouts-Arizona Cactus-Pine Council (GSACPC), held its first Annual Meeting in 1936 and was incorporated in the State of Arizona in 1940. GSACPC is chartered by Girl Scouts of the USA (GSUSA), a national organization with a global sisterhood, headquartered in New York City. The national office provides program materials to all councils to ensure Girl Scouting is nationally consistent.

What We Do

The Girl Scout Movement was founded to help all girls to reach their full potential and to create a safe place for girls to foster their individual growth, character, and self-sufficiency and leadership. Girl Scouts provides access to skill-building program, opportunities, and supportive adults through the Girl Scout Leadership Experience—our research-backed learning model that guides girls through discovering, connecting, and taking action.

Our Local Council

GSACPC covers central and northern Arizona and is responsible for the leadership, administration, and supervision of the Girl Scout program in this area. In partnership with thousands of adult volunteers – who act as troop leaders, mentors, program assistants, consultants, and board members – GSACPC serves girls grades K-12 in more than 90 local communities, including military installations,

border communities and 19 distinct Native American populations in tribal communities and urban centers.

Our jurisdiction is rich with diversity. GSACPC will not deny membership to staff, board, donors, girl, and adult members or volunteers into the organization because of race, color, ethnicity, religious or spiritual beliefs, age, national origin, socioeconomic status, documentation status, disability, gender identity or sexual orientation. We serve girls in every economic class, including girls in foster care, girls whose parents are incarcerated, girls who have been trafficked, are undocumented or newly immigrated, and girls experiencing economic or social poverty.

Staff members support direct services to girls, the volunteers who work with them, and their surrounding communities. The GSACPC Board of Directors is responsible for managing the business and corporate affairs of the Council. The Chief Executive Officer is responsible to the Board of Directors for overall operations of the Council.

Camps

The Bob & Renee Parsons Leadership Center for Girls and Women at Camp South Mountain in Phoenix is a year-round urban program center on 14.5 acres and ADA accessible.

Camp Maripai is on 80 acres near Prescott, Arizona. The gorgeous mountain terrain is full of boulder fields and pine forests.

Shadow Rim Ranch is located on 40 acres near Payson, in the shadow of the Mogollon Rim in the Tonto National Forest.

Willow Springs Program Center is a modern facility covering 190 acres surrounded by the Prescott National Forest.
