



## JULIETTE LOW – WORLD FRIENDSHIP

The purpose of the World Friendship Patch is to increase the awareness of the way others live and an appreciation of their culture, as well as increase the knowledge of the World Association of Girl Guide and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS).

### ACTIVITIES

- » **Girl Scout Brownies** – complete 12 activities, including the 7 starred activities.
- » **Girl Scout Juniors** – complete 15 activities, including the 7 starred activities.
- » **Girl Scout Cadettes** – complete 18 activities, including the 7 starred activities.
- » **Girl Scout Seniors** – complete 18 activities, including the 7 starred activities.



1. \*Learn about the founders of Girl Scouting/Girl Guiding.
2. Learn about women artists and writers from other countries.
3. Name five major religions of the world and learn something about each of them. Design a word scramble for the five major religions.
- 4.\* Learn the meaning of the World Association pin and the Thinking Day symbol.
5. Find out how many member organizations is part of WAGGGS.
6. Mark the countries on a map that contribute to your community's population OR Make a geographic family tree of troop members.
- 7.\* Plan or attend a special celebration for Juliette Low's birthday on October 31; and Thinking Day on February 22; and the birthday of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. on March 12.
8. Celebrate a holiday with international customs.
9. Find out what process a person must go through to become a United States citizen.
- 10.\* Learn more about the four World Centers. Where are they and in what countries are they located?
11. Find out how many regions WAGGGS is divided into. Name fifteen of them.
12. Name currencies used in six other countries.
- 13.\* Choose another country and learn about Girl Scouts, Girl Guides, their pin, Promise, and two activities.

14. Learn to say “Thank You” in four languages.
15. Learn about Olave, Lady Baden-Powell, and World Chief Guide, loved by all Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.
16. Learn about the different educational opportunities girls and women have in other countries. Compare these to the educational opportunities available in the United States.
17. Where did tie-dyeing originate? Try tie-dyeing a T-shirt or wall hanging.
18. Do a service project to increase international awareness.
19. Attend a local international festival.
- 20.\*Learn about the purpose of the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund.
21. Find out if a Cadette or Senior Girl Scout from your Council has ever been selected to participate in an international opportunity.
22. Make a contribution to the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund on one of the special Girl Scout Days listed below:
  - Juliette Low’s Birthday (October 31)
  - Thinking Day (February 22)
  - Girl Scout Birthday (March 12)
23. Visit a local supermarket, department store or home supply store and create a map or chart showing in which countries products originated.
